Greetings from Father Wierzba

Lent, more or less, is a time of more and less. We are encouraged to engage in more prayer, more fasting and more fasting, while partaking in less of something (like meat on Fridays) or something that we have “given up”. The practice of more and less is helpful for our spiritual growth and well-being. We learn to get along with less in order to give God more.

WHAT IS THE MOST INTERESTING THING YOU ARE STUDYING NOW AND WHY?

STEVEN WELLER - Epistemology, the study of knowledge. The class is interesting as I study philosophers who think we can know a lot, a little, or nothing at all. Sometimes, ironically, I don't know what they are talking about.

PETER KIEFFER - Canon Law of Marriage. It is interesting to me because I enjoy learning about how the Church is structured and how it helps people in various situations

MICHAEL IWANSKI - Epistemology--the study of knowledge. I enjoy it because our professor is a really cool, down-to-earth type of guy who makes the topic fun and interesting.

AARON BECKER - The Eucharist. As Catholics Jesus gives us such an amazing gift in the Mass, His very own body, blood, soul, and divinity. It is remarkable to discover anew and in greater depth how the fact of His real presence in the Mass is revealed in Scripture and preserved throughout history.

BRANDON GUENTHER - The Trinity. I find it interesting because it is really the base and form of all theology. It also deals with the greatest mystery, the inner life of God Himself. What an incredible gift it is to get to know Him through my studies!

TIMOTHY REITHER - My Tolkien seminar class. I am learning what role truth, myth and mystery play in our world and in our Catholic faith. It is exciting to see the world alive and flowing with the power of God in a whole new way.

ERIC MASHAK - Spanish: This is most interesting because I really like seeing how different languages attempt to convey the same meanings and concepts with different words and expressions.

JARED CLEMENTS - Computer Architecture. I am learning how languages compile, like Java or C++, and how to optimize the code for speed. I like this because I really enjoy programming computers. I have been doing that since I was in 7th grade.

ETHAN HOKAMP - Hebrew. It is interesting because it is the original language of most of the Bible and because it has a completely different alphabet than any Latin-based language.

LEVI SCHMITT - In my Pastoral Care and Counseling class I am studying how to speak one-on-one with people that are facing different life situations. It's my most interesting course since I'm learning

from my experience with people rather than with books.

MATTHEW BOWE - Humanities. Thus far, most of the short stories and the movie that we watched have been powerfully gloomy, touching upon a unique aspect of the human nature.

KYLE LAYLAN - I would say "Ecclesiology", a.k.a., the study of the Church. It answers questions such as, "Why do we have the Church?", "What role do people play in the Church?", "What is the mission of the Church?", etc... The reason I find this subject the most interesting thing I am studying right now is because it looks like I'll be spending a lot of time with this Church!

CHRISTIAN RUF - The philosophy of J.R.R. Tolkien at St. Mary's University in Winona. I was really excited to see that one of the classes that was offered for philosophy this semester was about J.R.R. Tolkien and was even more thrilled when I was able to get in before it was full. We have been reading about Tolkien's life and about his myth making in *The Lord of the Rings* and *The Hobbit* and how all of that relates to how we look at myth and storytelling. It is really great to go back and reread and look again at the books that I grew up reading and it makes them come more alive for me.

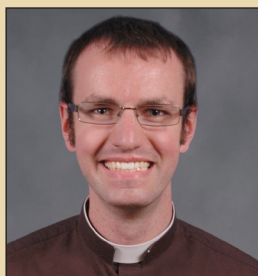
SAM MCCARTY - Right now I'm taking a class on the history of Catholicism in the U.S., and it has provided very interesting insight into the ever changing and often tense relationship between America and the Church.

DANIEL SEDLACEK - St. Augustine of Hippo's understanding of prayer. In his Letter to Proba, a widow, he explains what it means to "pray always." "What else does that mean but, 'desire without ceasing the happy life,' which is none but eternal life, and desire it from him who alone can give it?" Let us always desire this and always pray for this from the Lord God.

JOSEPH RICHARDS - Right now my favorite academic work is on a master's in philosophy thesis. I'm writing about religious belief and what we need to have in order to say belief is true. It's a good dive into epistemology- the philosophy of knowledge.

ARTURO VIGUERAS - The Christology of Joseph Ratzinger (Pope Benedict XVI). One of the books that I love for this class is Romano Guardini's *The Lord*. This book is a series of homilies given by Guardini and it has helped me a lot to better understand my spiritual life. Here is a quote from the Book: "[The Incarnation]

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SEMINARIAN SPOTLIGHT PETER KIEFFER

As I am approaching ordination to the diaconate, I am beginning to take certain courses that are geared toward the ministry of deacons. For example, I am taking classes this semester in canon law of marriage, in preaching, and in how to serve as a deacon at

different liturgies (Masses, baptisms, weddings, etc.). These classes have made my excitement to be a deacon increase more and more. What has me the most excited about becoming a deacon is being able to serve as a deacon at the Mass, particularly being able to give homilies and to assist as a deacon at the altar.

The part that has me a bit nervous about becoming a deacon is the awareness of the responsibility that I am preparing to receive. Deacons act in the person of Christ the Servant, which is a pretty lofty responsibility.

Acting in the person of Christ the Servant as a deacon it will be common to see me wearing a collar. In the times that I have worn a collar since declaring candidacy I have not noticed people treating me that differently. However, I think that people do look upon those who wear a collar as someone who represents God, in one way or another. I pray that, by God's grace, I may not only represent God well, but also serve others well and lead them closer to Him.

JOHN ZWEBER - The book I am reading for my formation class which gives advice from the church doctors on how to live a life of holiness

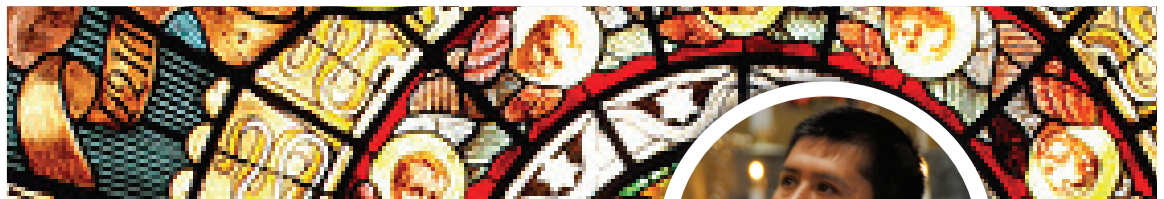

TYLER RIESE - One of the things that is a joy for me is simply shooting the breeze with one of brother seminarians while playing a game of pool (or 3 or 5 games).

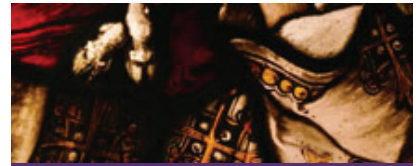
