Information on how to celebrate "Sunday of the Word of God" on January 24

On September 30, 2019, the feast day of Saint Jerome, Pope Francis instituted a new celebration on the Third Sunday of Ordinary time: the Sunday of the Word of God. Cardinal Sarah has recently issued a note from the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments that offers practical ideas on how pastors and the faithful can observe the day, celebrated next on January 24, 2021. Cancelled: Diocesan celebration of the Rite of Election, February 21

After receiving input from other dioceses around the country and in the state of Wisconsin, and after hearing from RCIA Coordinators from within the Diocese of La Crosse, Bishop Callahan has cancelled the diocesan celebration of the Rite of Election and Call to Continuing Conversion at the Cathedral this year. Instead, Bishop Callahan will delegate to each pastor with catechumens and candidates permission to celebrate the Rite in the parish. The Rite can take place either within or outside of Mass, usually on the First Sunday of Lent (February 21)

or the week preceding or after. If only unbaptized catechumens will be elected, see the RCIA book at number 118; if only baptized candidates will be called, see the RCIA book at number 446; if both catechumens and candidates will participate, see the combined rite at RCIA, number 547. Lenten Regulations

The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 17. Lenten regulations are as follows:

- 1. Catholics who have celebrated their 14th birthday are to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays in Lent, and Good Friday.
- 2. In addition to abstaining from meat, Catholics who have celebrated their 18th birthday, until they celebrate their 59th birthday, are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Those who are bound to this regulation may eat only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

Distribution of Ashes on Ash Wednesday

The Congregation for Divine Worship in Rome recently released the following instructions for the distribution of Ashes during the present pandemic conditions: "The Priest says the prayer for blessing the ashes. He sprinkles the ashes with holy water, without saying anything. Then he addresses all those present and only once says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general: 'Repent, and believe in the Gospel', or 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return'. The Priest then cleanses his hands, puts on a face mask, and distributes the ashes to those who come to him or, if appropriate, he goes to those who are standing in their places. The Priest takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything."

The US Bishops' Committee on Divine Worship continues: "These changes minimize the necessity of physical contact between minister and recipient and remove the need for the minister to speak while in close proximity to the recipient. The distribution of ashes via sprinkling is a common practice in some countries but is not well known here. Therefore, the Committee encourages ministers to provide some explanation to the faithful, to avoid unnecessary confusion."

The faithful ought to be alerted to this alternative manner of distributing ashes in 2021. As the Bishops' Committee on Divine Worship notes, while sprinkling ashes upon the top of the head is not customary in the United States, this legitimate manner of giving ashes is practiced in other countries around the world. The Ash Wednesday texts from the Missal themselves speak variously of ashes "put on our heads" "receive[d] upon our heads," and "place[d] on the head." The practice also recalls Old Testament accounts of "the Israelites gathered together while fasting and wearing sackcloth, their heads covered with dust" (Nehemiah 9:1).

Feast Day of Blessed James Miller: February 13

Blessed James Miller was declared "blessed" on Saturday, December 7, 2019 in Huehuetenango Guatemala. (Read Bishop Callahan's tribute to his life, here.) While there are

no proper liturgical texts for Mass or the Liturgy of the Hours on his February 13 feast day (the anniversary date of his death), Blessed James may be celebrated using texts from the "Common of Martyrs: For One Missionary Martyr" at Mass and the "Common of One Martyr" at the Liturgy of the Hours. Readings at Mass may be taken from the weekday or from the similar sections of the Lectionary.

Prayer for the Intercession of Blessed Brother James Miller, FSC

February 13, 2021, will mark the second annual observance of the feast day of Blessed James Miller. A prayer for his intercession has been approved by Bishop Callahan:

"O Blessed Brother James Miller, you heard God's call to become a Brother of the Christian Schools and so became a sign of faith to youth in the United States and in Central America. You placed your life and your trust in Divine Providence and, for spreading the faith, merited the crown of martyrdom. In a world that denies the dignity of the human person, obtain for us from Divine Providence an ever increasing love of God and our neighbor, especially the poor and oppressed. Obtain for us also the favor we are now asking for [mention request] and the grace and strength to be a witness to Christ's love to all. Amen."

DIOCESE OF LA CROSSE GUIDELINES FOR REPORTING INSTANCES OF CHILD ABUSE

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month ~ it's not too early to start planning. Organize a Mass for survivors/victims of clergy child sexual abuse at your parish and live stream via your diocesan social media channels.

Child Abuse Prevention Month Homily Helps

Throughout the Gospel, Christ calls upon his followers to care for the most vulnerable among us, especially children.

Our faith also calls for us to uphold the value of human life and the dignity of the human person. The protection of children is the responsibility of the entire Church, including the faithful. The protection of children and youth from abuse and other harm is a respect life issue, and we must all do our part to uphold this ideal.

During Child Abuse Prevention Month, we are reminded of the call to be instruments of justice, working for the common good of all, which includes the protection of children. As Jesus entrusts to Peter the care of the flock, we are reminded that this responsibility belongs to everyone as a matter of charity and justice.

Child Abuse Prevention Month should lead to heightened awareness of the need to be vigilant about providing a safe environment for all within the Church and for our communities.

Recent statistics tell us one out of every four girls, and one out of every six boys, are assaulted before they turn 18. If those statistics are correct, on every Sunday in our congregation are people who have been abused and are feeling the pain of that abuse. Reaching out to all victims/survivors of abuse is critical in bringing hope and the love of Christ to them. Our diocese is here to provide anyone suffering from abuse with steps towards healing.

We are all part of a larger culture of protection and healing within the Church. As members of this culture, we value the prevention of abuse and the support of those who have been abused. Each one of us can play an important role in strengthening this culture. For example, we can better prevent abuse by ensuring that the signs of abuse are identified and reported. Noticing these warning signs, taking them seriously, and reporting them could prevent abuse in the future. Even when we witness inappropriate behavior or something that just doesn't seem quite right, we must report our concerns through the appropriate channels.

We can also play a role in victim outreach by offering support, compassion, and prayers to those close to us who have been abused. The importance we place on carrying out these acts of charity will go a long way in creating a culture within our Church where children are safe, and victim/survivors find healing.

Other ways to promote Child Abuse Prevention Month

Have a rosary led by the pastor with special intentions for victims/survivors of clergy child sexual abuse.

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is one of the most beautiful ways to pray. Organize a livestream of adoration celebrated at your parish to commemorate child abuse prevention efforts.

Wisconsin Bishops issue Statement on Morality of COVID-19 Vaccines

There are three COVID-19 vaccines that are available (currently only for the most vulnerable populations), or likely to be available in the coming months. They are from Pfizer, Moderna, and AstraZeneca. Neither Pfizer nor Moderna used morally compromised cell lines in producing the vaccine, but they did use a morally compromised line (from kidney cells taken from an aborted child in the Netherlands in 1972) for confirmatory testing. The AstraZeneca vaccine used that cell line in the design, development, and production stages of that vaccine, as well as for confirmatory testing. Where possible, then, the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines are to be preferred. But the US Bishops Conference has recently stated that all three are morally permissible because of the remoteness of the material cooperation in the evil of abortion. Catholic moral theology has always made a distinction between formal and material cooperation in an act which is morally compromised. Formal cooperation with a moral evil such as abortion is always sinful. An example of this kind of cooperation might be the doctor or nurse who directly assists with, and intends, the abortion itself. Material cooperation can be different in that it does not intend the evil act and is often more distant or remote from the act itself. Paycheck Protection Program 2 (PPP2)

Parishes that are eligible and wish to apply for the second PPP2 loan must first get the Parish Finance Councils' recommendation and approval from the Parish Corporation Board.

The Small Business Administration (SBA) will be opening the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP2) broadly Tuesday, January 13. The program is intended to support small businesses who have experienced major financial impacts from COVID. Both First and Second Draw loans are available.

Eligibility requirements reminder

First Draw PPP loans: Parishes who did not previously receive a PPP loan will be eligible to apply for a First Draw loan of up to \$10 million, using similar criteria from the initial round:

- Businesses and entities in operation on February 15, 2020 (and not permanently closed).
- Small businesses, 501(c)(3) nonprofits, 501(c)(19) veterans' organizations or tribal business concerns that have fewer than 500 employees or otherwise meet the SBA size standard.
- Businesses in the accommodation and food service sector that employ 500 or fewer employees per physical location.
- Entities such as housing cooperatives, tax-exempt "business league" organizations under Internal Revenue Code section 501(c)(6), news organizations, and destination marketing organizations are now eligible, subject to additional requirements.

Second Draw PPP loans: Small businesses, 501(c)(3) nonprofits, etc. similar to those open to First Draw loans, will be able to apply for a Second Draw PPP loan of up to \$2 million, provided they:

- Have used or will have used the full amount of their first PPP loan (including any increase, if applicable) prior to disbursement of the second PPP loan.
- Were in operation on February 15, 2020 (and have not permanently closed) and employ 300 or fewer employees.
- Can demonstrate at least a 25% reduction in gross receipts in any quarter in 2020 when compared against certain past quarterly results.

How does God speak to me?

Have you ever wondered how God may be speaking to you? Perhaps you are waiting to hear a loud, booming voice come from the heavens to tell you what to do or which way to go. While this isn't completely out of the question, often God takes a much subtler approach. In 1 Kings, we have the account of the Prophet Elijah standing at the entrance of a cave, waiting for the Lord to appear. As he waits, he encounters a strong, violent wind, a powerful earthquake, and a consuming fire, yet God was not revealing Himself in any of those powerful examples. Finally, as Elijah waited, he heard a soft, quiet whisper. At that, he knelt to the ground and prayed. God often speaks to us, not in grand and impressive ways, but in the silence. When we can still our hearts, that's when we begin to hear His voice, calling us into relationship and to follow Him. Sometimes that invitation is to follow the Lord as one who lovingly serves others in the priesthood. All letters of suitability are created in the Office for Safe Environment. Please email or call in your request at least five business days prior to your event to ensure your letter arrives at your location in time.

Your request should include the following:

- Where you are going, including the full church or event name and the address.
- What diocese will you be in.
- The date you will be at the event.
- Who is the contact at the parish or event.
- If it is a wedding, include the name of the bride and groom or the name of the deceased for a funeral.
- What you will be doing at the event, i.e. celebrating Mass, hearing confession, speaking, etc.
