PRESENTATION OF THE LITURGY OF THE HOURS

28 Then, if it seems appropriate, the Bishop gives the newly consecrated the book containing the prayer of the Church, saying these or similar words:

Receive the book of the Liturgy of the Hours, the prayer of the Church; may the praise of our heavenly Father be always on your lips; pray without ceasing for the salvation of the whole world.

All reply together:

Amen.

The newly consecrated come before the Bishop, who gives each a copy of the liturgy of the hours. After receiving it, they return to their places and remain standing.

29 Then, if appropriate, this or some other suitable antiphon is sung.

I am espoused to him whom the angels serve; sun and moon stand in wonder at his glory.

II. PRINCIPAL DUTIES OF THOSE CONSECRATED

2 Those who consecrate their chastity under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit do so for the sake of more fervent love of Christ and of greater freedom in the service of their brothers and sisters.

They are to spend their time in works of penance and of mercy, in apostolic activity, and in prayer, according to their state in life and spiritual gifts.

To fulfill their duty of prayer, they are strongly advised to celebrate the Liturgy of Hours each day, especially Lauds or Vespers. In this way, by joining their voices to those of Christ the High Priest and of his Church, they will offer unending praise to the heavenly Father and pray for the salvation of the whole world.

V. FORM OF THE RITE

7 For the consecration of women living in the world the rite described in Chapter I of this Ritual is to be used.

The rite consists of these parts:

g) the presentation of the insignia of consecration to symbolize a spiritual dedication.

We begin our meditation with the Gospel Canticle for Evening Prayer. The Magnificat. You may find this odd since the day begins in the morning.

However, looking at the visitation and Mary's response to Elizabeth comes before the birth of St John the Baptist and the proclamation of Zechariah.

Also, looking at each office book you find Sunday Evening Prayer I as the beginning "Hour' for the week.

This passage from the General Instruction found in Volume I page 21 suggests the normal progression but also has the imagery of the lamp...

"The witness of the early Church teaches us that individual Christians devoted themselves to prayer at fixed times...the last hour of the day when evening draws on and the lamp is lighted..." is followed by this next phrase, "or the first hour, when night draws to a close with the rising of the daystar."



This also calls to mind the antiphon used in the Rite of Consecration "The Calling of the Candidate" and the rubrics that follow.

"Be wise: make ready your lamps. Behold the Bridegroom comes; go out to meet him."

The candidates then light their lamps or candles and accompanied by the two women mentioned above (cf. no. 10,), approach the sanctuary, and stand outside it.

Pondering the Visitation, it may have happened toward the end of the day, the journey's end. Elizabeth responds to May's greeting and grace moves all!

The encounter of souls.

The encounter of Jesus and John.

Mary's reply filled with the years of pondering God's goodness.

Our entering into this mystery pondering God's action within our lives each day.

May our voice be one with hers.

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior,

for He has looked with favor on His lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed, the Almighty has done great things for me, and holy is His Name.

He has mercy on those who fear Him in every generation. He has shown the strength of his arm, He has scattered the proud in their conceit. He has cast down the mighty from their thrones and has lifted up the lowly. He has filled the hungry with good things, and the rich He has sent away empty. He has come to the help of His servant Israel for He has remembered his promise of mercy, the promise He made to our fathers, to Abraham and his children forever.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit,

as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be forever. Amen. Alleluia



Morning Prayer is filled with the silent anticipation for the day.

What marvels and beauty does it hold out for us to embrace?

We stand in the shadows of the home of Zechariah and Elizabeth.

We watch as the time has come for Elizabeth to bring forth her son.

Mary has been the handmaid of the Lord assisting her cousin these days, weeks, months, preparation both physically and spiritually for the birth of this long-awaited child.

Mary has helped with simple everyday things yet enriched knowing with Whom she was caring and who she was caring for, the one sent by God to prepare the way for her Son...

We can imagine after the child moved within Elizabeth's womb at the sound of her first greeting the days that followed, were days of grace for John and Jesus.

After the "quiet encouragement" we can imagine Jesus has given his cousin John in the womb of their respective mothers these past 6 months.

Now the fullness of time has come!

The child is born. The question is asked...

Zechariah writes. He writes the words that will break through the silence of the ages.

HIS NAME IS JOHN.

And with these few words all time becomes enriched with the glories of God's mercy.

Silence is broken.

The months of Zechariah's pondering God's Word not only in the prophets of old but in the very Presence of Jesus within the womb of Mary who has been helping these past months.

Grace upon grace.

The words of the song "Let all Mortal Flesh Keep Silence" come to mind.

Now the silence begins in a new way for Zechariah. Being able to speak he proclaims God's action within his heart soul mind and will.

We join in this prayer of praise each day.

May we not take for granted Our Lord's presence within our midst in the daily simple happenings.

May our pondering in the silence of prayer bring forth words that will enrich the lives of others. Words filled with the fruit of our quiet prayer.

Words enriched with His Divine Word made flesh and splendor of the Father who we are privileged to receive in the Holy Eucharist and visit in our Churches. Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel; he has come to his people and set them free. He has raised up for us a mighty savior, born of the house of his servant David.

Through his holy prophets he promised of old that he would save us from our enemies, from the hands of all who hate us.

He promised to show mercy to our fathers and to remember his holy covenant.

This was the oath he swore to our father Abraham: to set us free from the hands of our enemies, free to worship him without fear, holy and righteous in his sight all the days of our life.

You, my child, shall be called the prophet of the Most High;

for you will go before the Lord to prepare his way, to give his people knowledge of salvation by the forgiveness of their sins.

In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace.

May our day begin and end with proclaiming the greatness of our God!

The responsibility of prayer for the consecrated virgin is one given to her on the day of her consecration... the Liturgy of the Hours, the Divine Office, especially Morning and Evening Prayer. The "hinges" of her day have within them, in the words of Pope Benedict XVI, "The Lord's Prayer, the school of hope." May we learn from Jesus with the grace of our Consecration.
