

An impactful experience of Jesus in the

Other denominations of Christianity often have some form of "communion." or bread distributed during a church service, but the act of Adoration highlights our Catholic distinction: we know that Jesus is present in the Eucharist, and we treat the Eucharist accordingly. For me, that was a significant moment in showing Catholic doctrine in action, through worship.

A profound experience that I have had with the Eucharist, is

going to adoration with confessions being heard. Then going to confess my sins and feeling the weight of the sins being lifted off of me. It is like having a 50lb grain sack being taken off of my shoulders as I walk back into adoration to do my penance in front of Jesus sitting in the monstrance.

There are a lot of personal experiences that

I probably wouldn't share here, but as a new deacon. I am able to encounter the Eucharist in a very privileged way. I always appreciate being able to expose the Blessed Sacrament for adoration. The walk between the tabernacle and the altar is very precious; it is there that I am able to hold Jesus right next to my heart. In a way, I feel like the beloved disciple who reclined on the breast of Jesus at the Last Supper.



This January, all the seminarians in theology were given the privilege of going on a 9-day trip to Rome. I'm not going to lie; the trip over was pretty long. On top of all that, I had a severe cold at the beginning of the trip. I didn't sleep at all from US to Germany or from Germany to Rome. When we finally landed, we would have had a nice quiet bus ride to Assisi, but someone decided it would be a good idea to sing Christmas carols! Some moments are so irritating that they're actually pretty funny. and that was one of them.

Nonetheless, there's something about Rome and Assisi; no matter how you feel, they still manage to break through. We spent our first day touring Assisi. Once we got to the hotel, my roommate went to bed, and I found myself running through the streets of Assisi at night, just wanting to take it all in! No matter how tired or sick you are, the beauty and wonder still break through!

It was truly a wonderful trip, and we had some amazing opportunities. We saw many of the major basilicas, we had Mass with Pope Francis, we had Mass with Cardinal Dolan, and we had dinner with Cardinal Harvey, Cardinal Pell, and George Weigel. We saw works by Michelangelo and Raphael, we got a private tour of the Vatican Museum, and we got to pray all alone in the Sistine Chapel. There are so many more experiences that I cannot recount here.

It was also very moving for me to be in Rome during the passing of Pope Benedict XVI. I think we all have an attachment to the Pope of our youth. Not to make you feel old, but I was eight when he was elected. Pope Benedict has been very influential in my life. When I was 13, I wasn't a very prolific reader, but for some reason, I picked up his second encyclical, Spes Salve. I didn't understand most of it, but something sparked my interest. That encyclical was what first kindled my love for theology. Now, I am at the end of my theological studies as I prepare for the priesthood. I can't explain how moving it was for me to visit his body and to pay my respect and gratitude.

Being in Rome is a wonderful experience, and I would go back there in a heartbeat, but at times it can be a little overwhelming. The size of the churches, the quality of the art, and the whole experience is much more than you can take in. At times, it feels like you're just running from one overpowering thing to another. Nonetheless, a pilgrimage is not just a consumeristic sightseeing event; a pilgrimage is a place of encounter. As beautiful as all the churches and monuments are, I sometimes wanted to be back in our little chapel at seminary. There is actually something very good about this; no matter how big and beautiful the monuments are, you can remember that they are only a testimony to Jesus Christ. The greatest art and architecture in the world cannot compare to the One who lives inside every tabernacle. That's the purpose of a pilgrimage; you go so you can come back. You go on a pilgrimage to encounter the wonder of the One who called you, the One who still calls you, and the One who wants your life to be lived in His service.
