here are many clichés when it comes to life and advice. We see people journeying from far and near to draw near to our Lord in the Most Blessed Sacrament. And, it wasn't just worldly writers or leaders that have spoken about this, but many saints have weighed in on this life as a journey and pilgrimage, not just to some manmade destination, but to a person, to our



loving God. St. John Paul II said back in 1979, "The most beautiful and stirring adventure that can happen to you is the personal meeting with Jesus, who is the only one who gives real meaning to our lives."

It is this meeting with Jesus that our local Church and in particular, our seminarians have been involved in. Beginning with the National Eucharistic Processing that passed through the Diocese at the beginning of June and culminating in the National Eucharistic Congress, we have had the opportunity to enter into this once in a lifetime event by joining the faithful from across the country to draw near to Jesus, to meet him as we step outside of our normal lives and seek Him. This is what vocation is all about, this is what our seminarians are seeking to do in a much bigger way as they seek to do what God is calling them to do. They seek Christ to guide them to know their way here and know, how they are being called to give their lives for others, but also to guide them to their eternal home in heaven. Please continue to support and pray for our seminarians as they seek Christ and for many more young men to hear the call of Jesus inviting them to embark on the pilgrimage to serve and bring others to Him.

I end with this beautiful quote from St.

John Paul II at World Youth Dav in 2000. "It is Jesus in fact that you seek when you dream of happiness; he is waiting for you when nothing else you find satisfies you; he is the beauty to which you are so attracted; it is he who provokes you with that thirst for fullness that will not let vou settle for compromise: it is he who urges you to shed the masks of a false life; it is he who reads in your hearts your most genuine choices, the choices that others try to stifle. It is Jesus who stirs in you the desire to do something great with your lives, the will to follow an ideal, the refusal to allow yourselves to be grounded down by mediocrity, the courage to commit yourselves humbly and patiently to improving yourselves and society, making the world more human and more fraternal... Have no fear of entrusting yourselves to him! He will guide you, he will grant you the strength to follow him every day and in every situation."

This time of Eucharistic revival has been such a blessing for the Church! I will always cherish the memories made at The Answer, especially the Eucharistic procession across the river. I


can't wait to see how God continues to bless our nation as we prepare for the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis!
