Description: Emily, a leader in using ERI's apologetics to foster respectful and productive dialogues about abortion, will work with you to learn how to work with high schoolers who are bombarded by pro-choice culture. Emily understands it feels impossible to have meaningful conversations about controversial issues like abortion. But, rather than resort to angry debate or just avoid the topic, Emily wants students to be able to dialogue thoughtfully. This session will be especially helpful for those classrooms where students hold diverse political and religious viewpoints. How can we foster thoughtful, compassionate, and critical thinkers who engage in difficult conversations

with respect? Emily will work to help you form students into adults who think through important issues for themselves and apply Catholic values to their daily lives.

We will work to identify how the Science of Reading applies beyond elementary education and analyze the critical role fluency, vocabulary, comprehension, and background knowledge have in adolescent literacy. Best practice instructional strategies for any content area will be aligned with SoR principles for secondary students.

We will focus on three key areas where AI can provide the greatest support:

- 1. **Lesson Planning & Curriculum Design** Using AI as a creative assistant to generate ideas and resources while aligning everything with Catholic identity and virtue formation.
- 2. **Communication & Administration** Streamlining parent newsletters, emails, and reports so more time is freed for personal connection and leadership.
- 3. Faithful Discernment Understanding the limitations of AI, ensuring its use respects human dignity, and modeling to students how technology can be used wisely and ethically.

By keeping our use of AI focused, Catholic educators can reclaim valuable time, strengthen relationships, and stay rooted in their mission of forming disciples of Christ.
