



# Trust!

## God's Gift of Hope Never Disappoints

**Christian hope anchors our souls to the promises of God,** who is faithful and true. It assures us that no matter our failures, His mercy and love are stronger.

Hope is not simply optimism or wishful thinking. **It is a virtue given by God in Baptism that enables us to trust in His promises,** even when all may seem lost. The gift of hope reminds us that no matter how dark life becomes, God's love endures. Hope grows within us as we place "our trust in Christ's promises and rely not on our own strength, but on the help of the Holy Spirit." (CCC 1817).

**Hope, then, lifts our hearts beyond fear, failure, or weakness. Hope keeps us from discouragement, opens our hearts to future blessings, and leads us to live in charity.** Pope Benedict XVI wrote, "I can always continue to hope, even if in my own life, or the historical period in which I am living, there seems to be nothing left to hope for. Only the certitude of hope that my own life and history, despite all failures, are held firm by the indestructible power of God's Love...this gives them their meaning and importance; only this kind of hope can give the courage to persevere."

In every age, God raises up witnesses to rekindle hope in the hearts His people. The humble St. John Vianney lived at a time

when faith and hope had grown dim in France. Yet through his perseverance, prayer, and deep trust in God's mercy, he became a radiant sign of hope for thousands who came to him seeking God's forgiveness and peace.

St. John Vianney knew weakness well but embodied that certitude – a supernatural confidence in God. Though he struggled with his studies and nearly failed to become a priest, his steadfast trust in God never wavered. As a confessor, he wept with those burdened by sin and encouraged them to begin again in the mercy of Christ. His message was simple: *"God is quicker to forgive than a mother to snatch her child from the fire."* Those words reveal his unshakable conviction that God's mercy is always greater than our sins. That is the heart of Christian hope — the certainty that Christ's love is greater than any darkness.

When he was sent to the small village of Ars, St. John Vianney found a community indifferent to God. Instead of despairing, he turned to prayer, fasting, and the sacraments. Soul by soul, he rekindled faith and hope. St. John wept for the sins of the penitents in confession and had the constant hope of seeing sinners turn back to God. The power of God's mercy flowed through his tireless ministry as confessor, and the Lord restored hope to sinners who thought themselves beyond forgiveness.

We, too, are called to live this same hope. When we are burdened with any difficulty, the virtue of hope reminds us that Christ has already won the victory. Buoyed up by hope, we are preserved from turning inward on ourselves and led to the

joy that flows from helping others.

Let us turn to Jesus at any time of need and ask Him to help us cooperate with the grace we receive in the Holy Eucharist and Confession. Hope is rekindled by the same Spirit who strengthened St. John Vianney. Then, like him, we may persevere in confident trust, proclaiming by our lives that *"hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit."* (Romans 5:5)

Like St. John Vianney, let us turn to Christ each day with confidence, praying:

**O Lord, give us the trust that comes from the Good News of the Gospel, and help us to cling to that sure and certain hope that for those who love God all things come to good. "For You, O Lord, are my hope... my trust is in You." (Psalm 146:5)**
